 - 1. Additional and regular meetings with all regional partners to reach goals and get plans implemented.
- ii. Michael Kelley with BikeWalkKC asks how cities are planning and managing maintenance.
 - 1. Places that allocate funding for maintenance that are specific to bike infrastructure.
- iii. Bobby Evans asks how to combat backlash from bike infrastructure.
 - Unsure if there is a specific resource or toolkit. Recommendation is to define the goal and intent of bike plans before interacting with the public. Define what the infrastructure may look like before talking specific roads.

 - 1. They do not distinguish between bikes and pedestrians.
 - Borrowers far from MARC offices may need to do extra coordination with MARC staff to ensure frequent data retrieval.
 - 1. Outlying areas may need additional coordination
 - iv. MARC is looking at funding to replace counters or batteries

7. Roundtable Updates

- . Ron McLinden wishes to address concerns with gaps in pedestrian infrastructure system and pedestrian safety concerns.
 - i. Would like to see MARC analyze the fifty-yard connections between services, amenities, and residential areas.
 - ii. Patrick mentioned the Complete Streets Policy
 - iii. Art Gough raises point about stronger bicycle emphasis in committee and how more than just sidewalks need to be addressed for pedestrian safety
 - 1. Additional pedestrian issues and topic within the committee.
 - iv. Bobby Evans makes point that bike infrastructure is coming from zero while there is some walkable infrastructure. Bobby acknowledges loss of neighborhood grocery stores due to zoning changes.

- 1. Agrees that walking is a major part of climate resilience and that bike facilities do benefit pedestrians by adding some separation between cars and pedestrians.
