Good afternoon!

As you mentioned earlier this month at the MARC STP committee meeting, that the MARC STP Committee has a PROBLEM - too much of a fund balance, and you mentioned that MoDOT central office in Jefferson City is even concerned.

Solution

The City of Harrisonville would respectively request that Harrisonville petition the MARC STP committee and request that the funding of the FY 2025-2026 South Street (MO Hwy 2) and Independence Intersection Improvement project award **in the amount of \$909,024**; and transfer the award of the funds from the South Street (MO Hwy 2) and Independence Intersection Improvement project to the S. Commercial Street Extension project because as of three weeks ago the S. Commercial Street Extension project received funding from the Governor's Transportation Cost Share Grant.

As you have indicated, the MARC STP committee has a growing balance of project funds and MARC STP staff requested on January 10, 2023, that if any project could be moved forward that MARC staff would like the municipalities to request the moving forward of the project, and the MARC STP Committee would consider moving forward funds towards the project.

As you may recall, and see the attached scoring summary, the S. Commercial Street Extension project scored a few points below the South Street (MO Hwy 2) and Independence Intersection Improvement project that was awarded funding in FY 2025-2026, but it was City staff that requested and negotiated for the lower rated project (South Street (MO Hwy 2) and Independence Intersection Improvement project) be awarded rather than Harrisonville's higher scoring project (E. Elm Street and Hwy 7 Improvements project); and as the lesser scoring and the eventually funded project (South Street (MO Hwy 2) and Independence Intersection Improvement project), rather than the higher rated project which was the E. Elm Street and Hwy 7 Improvements project.

The City of Harrisonville would respectively request the awarded funds (\$909,024) from FY 2025-2026 for the South Street (MO Hwy 2) and Independence Intersection Improvement project be transferred to the S. Commercial Street Extension Improvement project for funding in FY 2025 (beginning July 2024). The city plans to submit a Request For Qualifications and have the engineering design completed in 2024 and start construction in 2025, see attached schedule.

The City of Harrisonville is currently working with a developer very interested in purchasing the property in which the S. Commercial Street Extension Improvement project roadway

alignment would be located between S. Brookhart Drive and E. 267th Street in Harrisonville. See attached general layout of the proposed S. Commercial Street Extension Improvement project.

In hindsight, City staff did not believe that the S. Commercial Street Extension project had much of a chance to obtain funding from the Governor's Transportation Cost Share Grant, and now the city just negotiated the wrong project at the time to receive MARC STP funding; and we should have negotiated and leverage our argument for the S. Commercial Street Extension project instead of the recently selected and now approved South Street (MO Hwy 2) and Independence Intersection Improvement Project as part of the FY 2025-26 project programing.

We respectively request from the MARC STP committee the funding of the S. Commercial Street Extension project in the amount of \$909,024 to support and supplement the Governor's Cost Share Grant award amount of \$1,340,867, and for the interconnection of the new roadway and existing streets to support the development and growth of the industrial and commercial area of southwest Harrisonville.

We appreciate your time to review our request and would be glad to provide any additional information that you may require of the city.

1. Welcome and Introductions

Committee Vice Chair Alysen Abel welcomed everyone to the special meeting, and introductions were made around the room. The meeting was in a hybrid format with many in-person attendees.

2. Approval of Meeting Summary

There was a motion to approve the November 8, 2022, meeting summary as presented. The motion was seconded and passed.

3. 2025-2026 Call for Projects

The committee was given a final opportunity to continue their review/discussion/development of programming scenarios for an STBG funding recommendation to present to the Total Transportation Policy Committee (TTPC) and MARC Board of Directors.

The Chair reviewed that during the November 8 meeting, amendments to the last motion were approved, then there was additional discussion, a failed motion and questions. A final vote of the motion was needed. The chair asked if there was additional discussion needed. With no additional modifications voiced, a Call for the Question was voiced to move the motion forward.

The funding goal for the STBG recommendations remained at \$63M. The motion had all the selected projects funded at 80% unless the community requested less, with the total funding of \$63,002,296.

A rollcall vote was held, and the recommended projects for 2025-2026 STBG funds was approved by voice vote of 24-4 with no abstentions. The list will be presented to the TTPC at 9:30 a.m. and MARC Board at noon, both on December 20th. The list is attached.

5. Other Business

Marisela Ward shared that through MoDOT's LPA Program, several projects were recently approved for the FY2023 Traffic Engineering Assistance Program (TEAP) with four within Kansas City District 4. Project sponsors should have been notified. They will be managed by Andrew Siler in Central office.

Two of the four projects are in the MARC region:

- Independence, Nolan Road and 35th Street
- Excelsior Springs, US Hwy 69 Intersections

Ron Achelpohl shared that the Missouri Highway and Transportation Commission will be in Kansas City December 6th for their Annual Meeting. MARC will hold a MoDOT public meeting here late afternoon the same day regarding the Unfunded Needs list that this committee helped to develop and was adopted by the MARC Board of Directors in October.





Alysen Abel shared she would be leaving her employment with Parkville in 3 ½ weeks to be the Kansas City area Municipal Team Leader with Garver. The committee was asked how they wanted to fill the position. The regular vote of the 2-year commitments of committee chair and vice chair is in May. Following a brief discussion, Doug Wesselschmidt moved to nominate someone to fill the position for the remainder of the current term and nominated Stephen Lachky, current Parkville alternate who Alysen shared would be willing to do so. Matt Nolker also volunteered himself. Nominations closed and with a voice vote, Stephen Lachky was selected to serve as Vice Chair until the end of the current term.

4. MoDOT Updates

Juan Yin shared the following MoDOT information:

- The 2023-2026 LPA on-call consultant list is finalized. There is an amount left of \$100,000. Contracts have been assigned to the new projects.
- PELL update: they are still working on level 3 screening process; next community advisory committee meetings will be April 6 and April 12.
- The STIP: official lists were finalized last week.

5. 2025-2026 Programming

Marc Hansen stated that all the projects recommended for FFY 2025-2026 have been through the approval process except with the Federal agencies. MARC staff will soon send award letters and the MARC fee invoices.

Included in the meeting packet was a request for consideration from the city of Harrisonville to shift the awarded funds of \$909,024 from their programmed STP FFY 2025-2026 South Street and Independence Intersection Improvement project to their S. Commercial Street Extension project. They were recently notified that the S. Commercial Street Extension project, which was their priority #1 FFY 2025-2026 STP application, was awarded \$1,340,867 from the Governor's Transportation Cost Share Grant program. The project is planned for completion in 2024/2025 with the goal to complete by the end of 2024. It would support the development and growth of the industrial and commercial area of southwest Harrisonville. During the previous meeting, MARC staff had asked if any projects could move forward to reduce the large balance of funds available. Harrisonville plans to re-apply for funds in the next funding round for the South Street and Independence Intersection Improvement project.

The Chair reviewed Harrisonville's 3 STP applications during the recent programming round: #1 priority – South Commercial Street Extension; Aligned; just under \$2,592,342; 57 score. #2 priority – E. Elm Street Sidewalk and Complete Streets; Aligned; \$3,924950; 63 score. #3 priority – So. St. (MO 2 Hwy) & S. Independence St. Intersection; Highly Aligned; \$1,136,280; 60 score

We are not asking for a change of the amount, only the project to receive the \$909,024 and advancing the year. We would defund the South Street project, fund the S. Commercial Street project, and accelerate the project to FFY 2024. Shifting years is an ability open to any programmed project and only requires committee approval. Marc added that the programmed STP funds would be combined with the Governor's cost share funds, bringing the total amount close to their original STP request of \$2.5M. Marc reviewed there would be an unobligated fund balance of \$14M if every programmed project in FY 2023 obligated. The extra funds are due to the increase of funds provided from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. Staff appreciates Carl for creating a way to help spend down the funds. Patty added that if any sponsors have a programmed project that could move forward, contact Marc Hansen.

Responding to one inquiry, Carl shared that the city still needs to contribute another \$1M plus the match. One member agreed we should consider this request and others when sponsors have tried to find or receive additional funds enabling them to move a project. Matt Nolker reminded the committee that during the prioritization process, Harrisonville was asked which of their projects they wanted to apply the \$909,024. They chose their #3 project and now are requesting to shift the funds to their #1 project and thought they should be able to take that action.

With no further discussion, Matt Nolker moved, and Alysen Abel seconded, to approve the city of Harrisonville's request to move \$909,024 from their South Street and Independence Intersection Improvement project to their S. Commercial Street Extension project and accelerate the funds to FFY 2024. The motion passed.

The action will be included in the March TIP amendment and will reflect the Governor's Cost Share portion.

During the last meeting, there was consensus to review the scoring criteria and several committee members indicated interest in serving on the workgroup. The KS STP Committee uses the same criteria, and they are interested in serving on the workgroup as well. Marc Hansen will find a time to meet.

6. CRRSAA Regional Preventive Maintenance Project

Darryl Fields shared that the project is ready for bid packets to be put together and asked Randy Gorton, the contracted consultant with BHC, to provide an update on the progress. Working with MoDOT/Marisela regarding their requirements and the schedule, and Nathan Hladky has created a draft bid packet. Plans are to have the bid packages complete in a couple weeks, MoDOT PSE review approval and obligate the funds late March; advertise 21 days, bid and award in April if timing works with the MARC Board schedule; and construction mid/late May 2023. Plan to have one agreement package per county. All contractors will be inspected as needed. A draft list of pavement markings would be emailed following the meeting and asked for confirmation responses by Tuesday, Feb. 21. 7. Reasonable Progress Report

Marc Hansen shared that since the last meeting the FFY 2023 OGL Arterial Traffic Management System Operations project with \$490,000 and Kansas City's Waukomis Complete Streets Upgrade/ Reconstruction Ph 1 project with \$2,321,854 had both obligated.

The ending 2022 STBG balance: \$14,824,024 The 2023 STBG Limitation: \$23,713,913

There would be an unobligated fund balance of \$14M if every programmed project in FY 2023 obligated.

There is an opportunity for a FFY 2024/2025/2026 project to move forward if ready. One option would be the 2025 KCATA project if they choose to do so. Contact MARC staff if you are interested.

The 2024-2026 lists will be updated based on the action approved today for Harrisonville's change requests. The following lists shown were the same as last month.

FFY 2024 Programmed STBG funds total \$21,355,600 with eight projects.

FFY 2025 Programmed STBG funds total \$28,860,184 with seven projects.

FFY 2026 Programmed STBG funds total \$35,342,112 with twelve projects

8. Other Business

Alysen Abel highlighted upcoming events: WTS has a professional development webinar later in February, and March 28th the new Overland Park City Manager, Lori Luther, will present a leadership topic and a meet and greet opportunity.

On behalf of Tom Jacobs who was unable to attend, Martin Rivarola shared information on a new program, Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), established by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. The program for FFY 2022-2026 has \$6 billion available nationally; 65% to MPOs; \$4.6M/year for the Kansas City region, and approximately \$2.75M/year for Missouri. A small task force from MARC committees worked on the programming process details to prepare for an initial FFY 2022-2024 Call for Projects late March with approximately \$8.25M on the Missouri side of the MARC region. The FFY 2025-2026 Call for Projects is planned for next year along with the regular suballocated programming of funds. A 20% match will be required, and funds may be obligated for projects that support the reduction of transportation emissions. For more information and list of eligible projects:
