



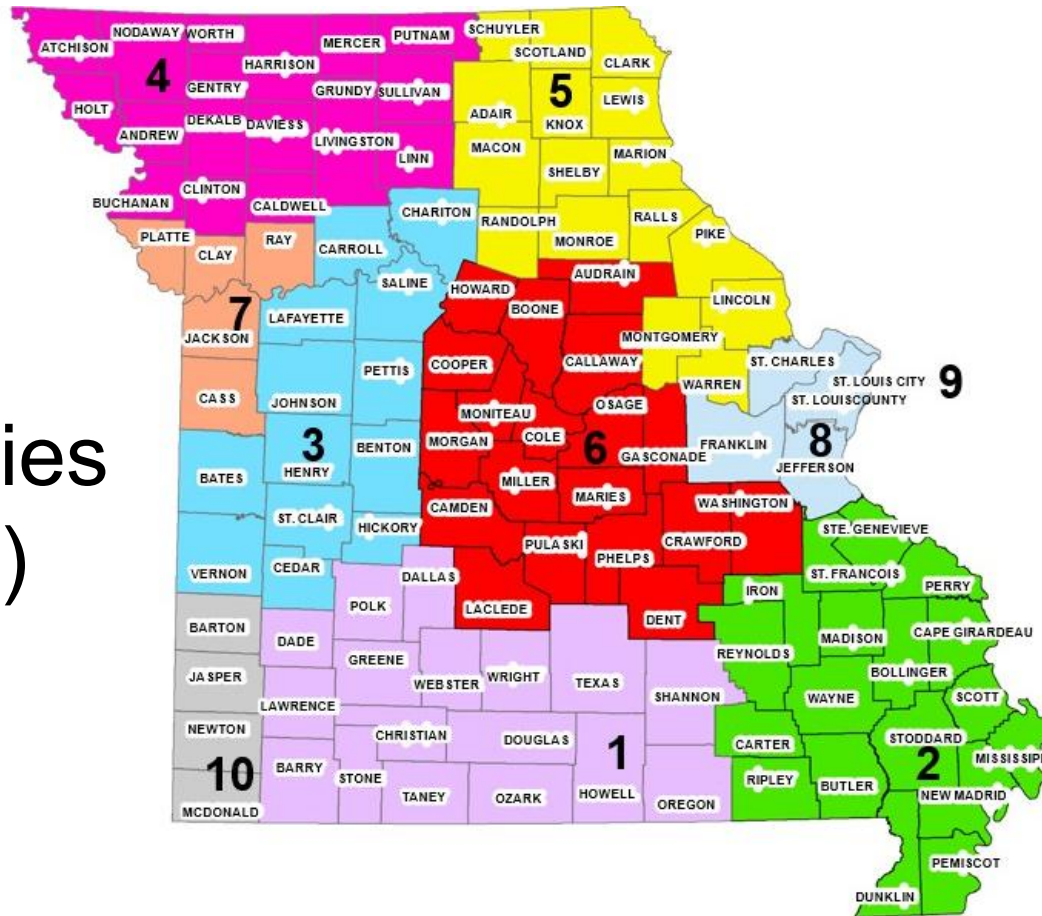

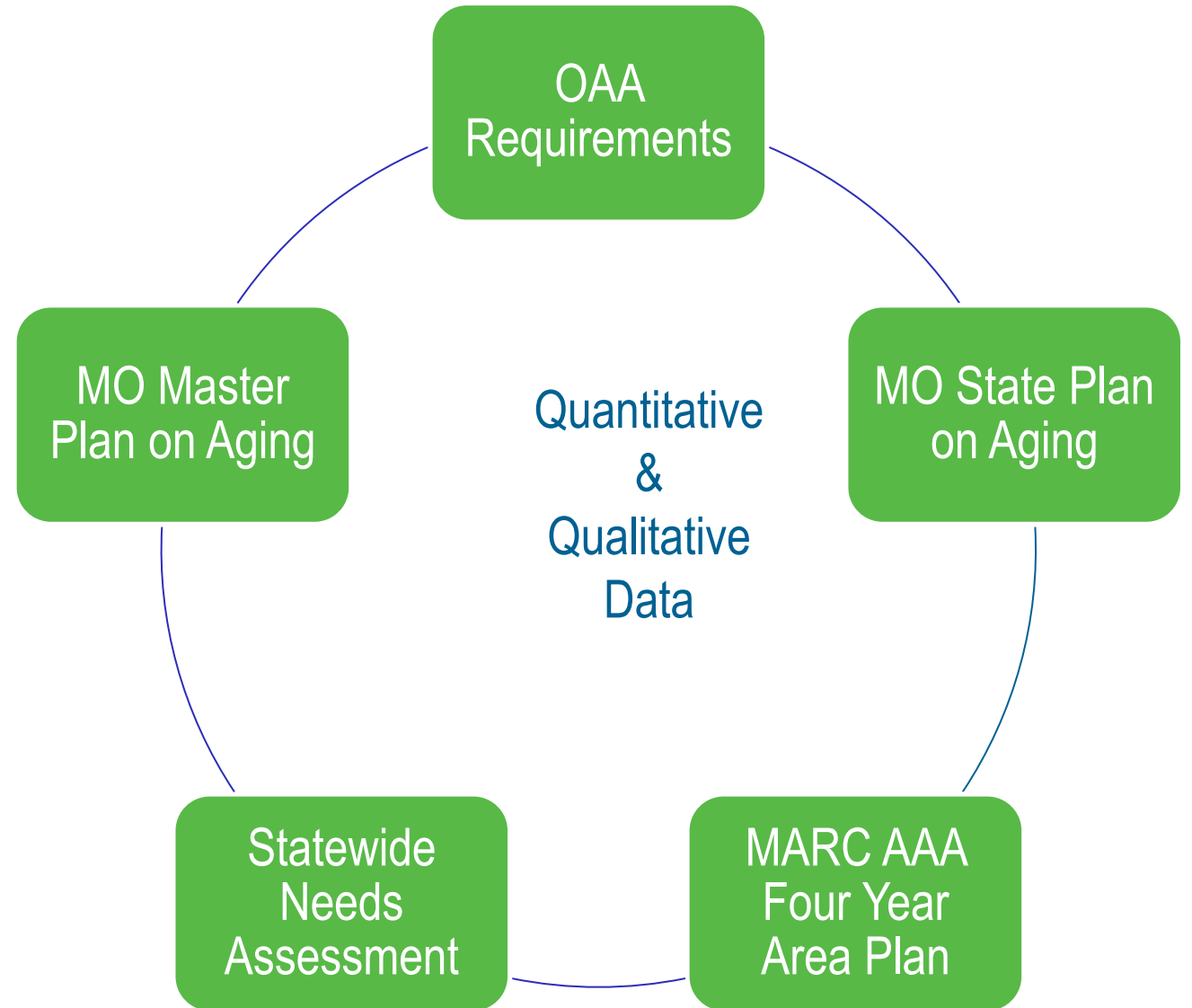

Missouri's aging population is increasing rapidly. By 2030, **one in five Missourians will be age 65 or older**, making planning essential.

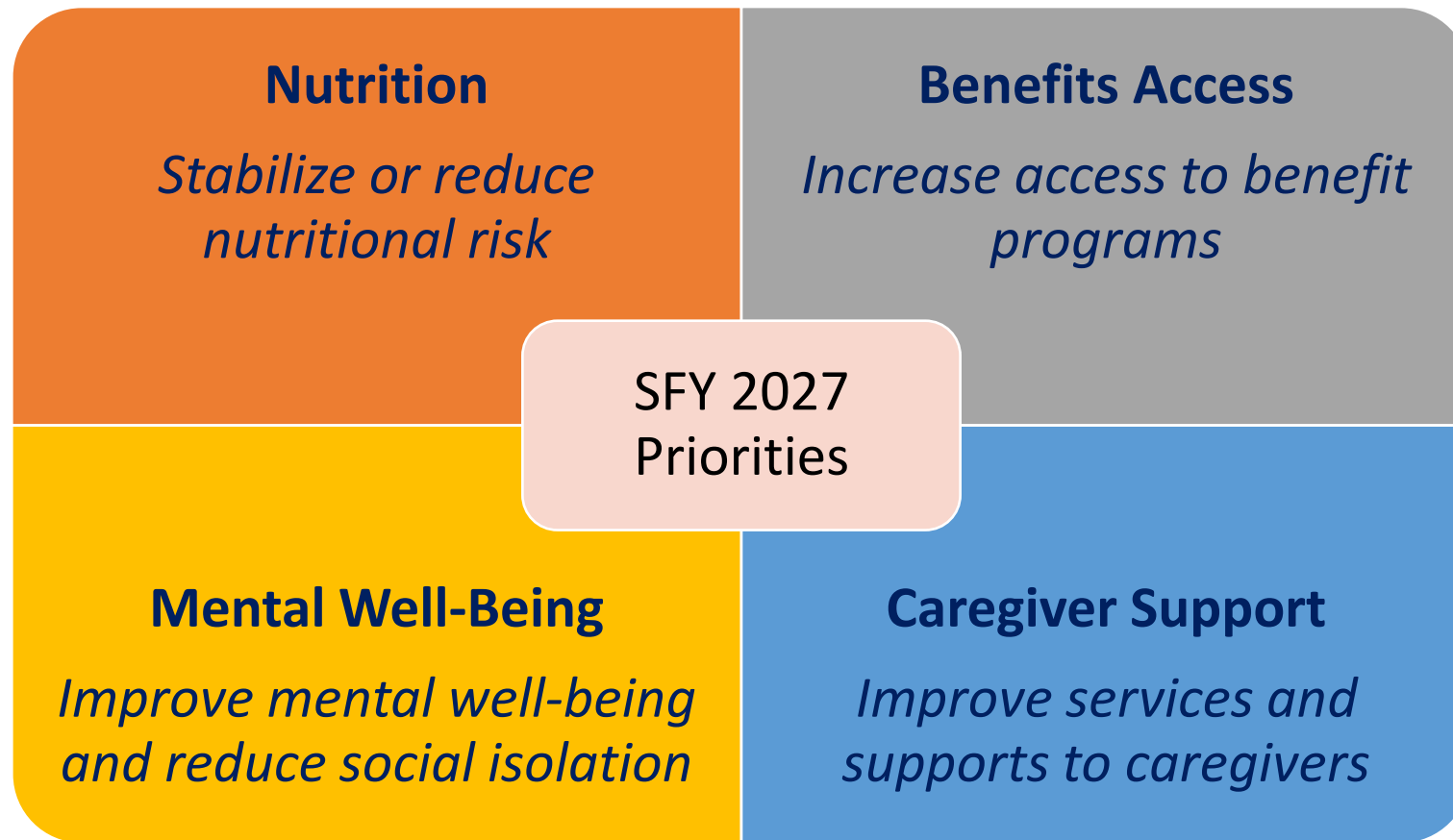
The plan outlines how AAAs help older adults maintain dignity, independence and quality of life in their communities.

Funding sources for MARC AAS include:

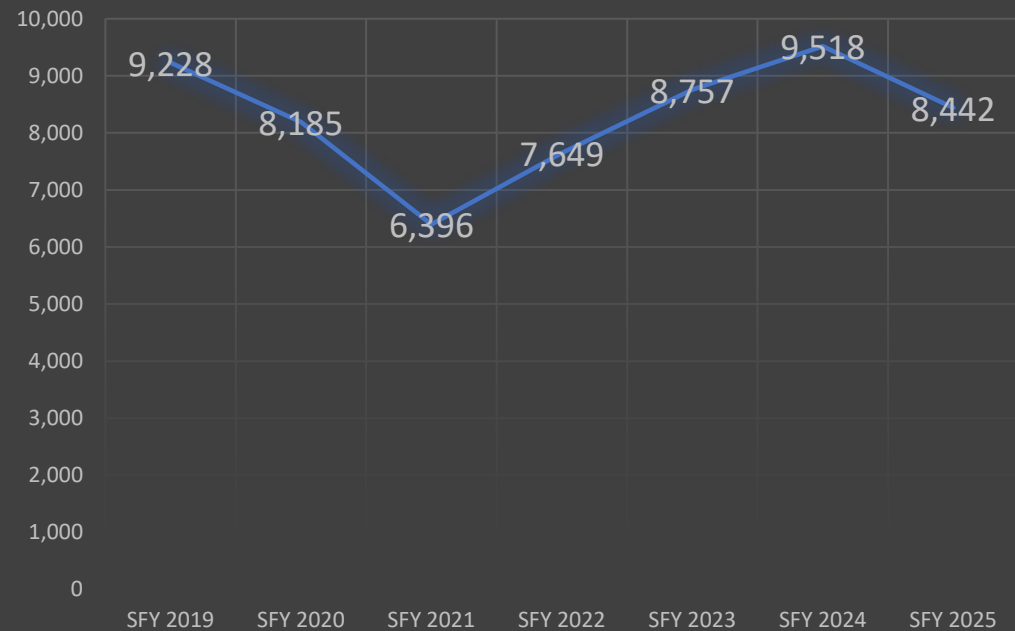
- Older Americans Act (OAA) federal funding.
- Missouri Senior Services Growth and Development Program (SSGDP) state funding.
- Missouri Medicaid.
- Department of Veterans Affairs.
- Integrated Care Contracts with third-party funders for health and social care.
- Federal, state and philanthropic grants
- In-kind donations.

AAA eligible participants aren't obligated to pay for OAA-funded services but can donate if they wish.

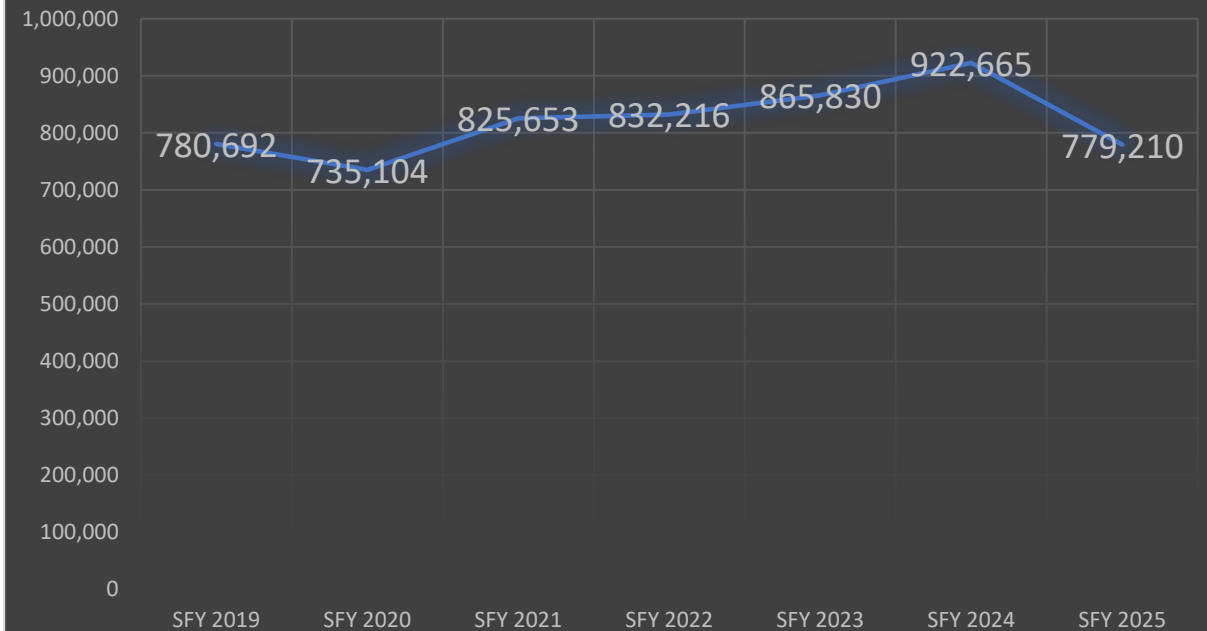
Service Trends



Unduplicated Persons



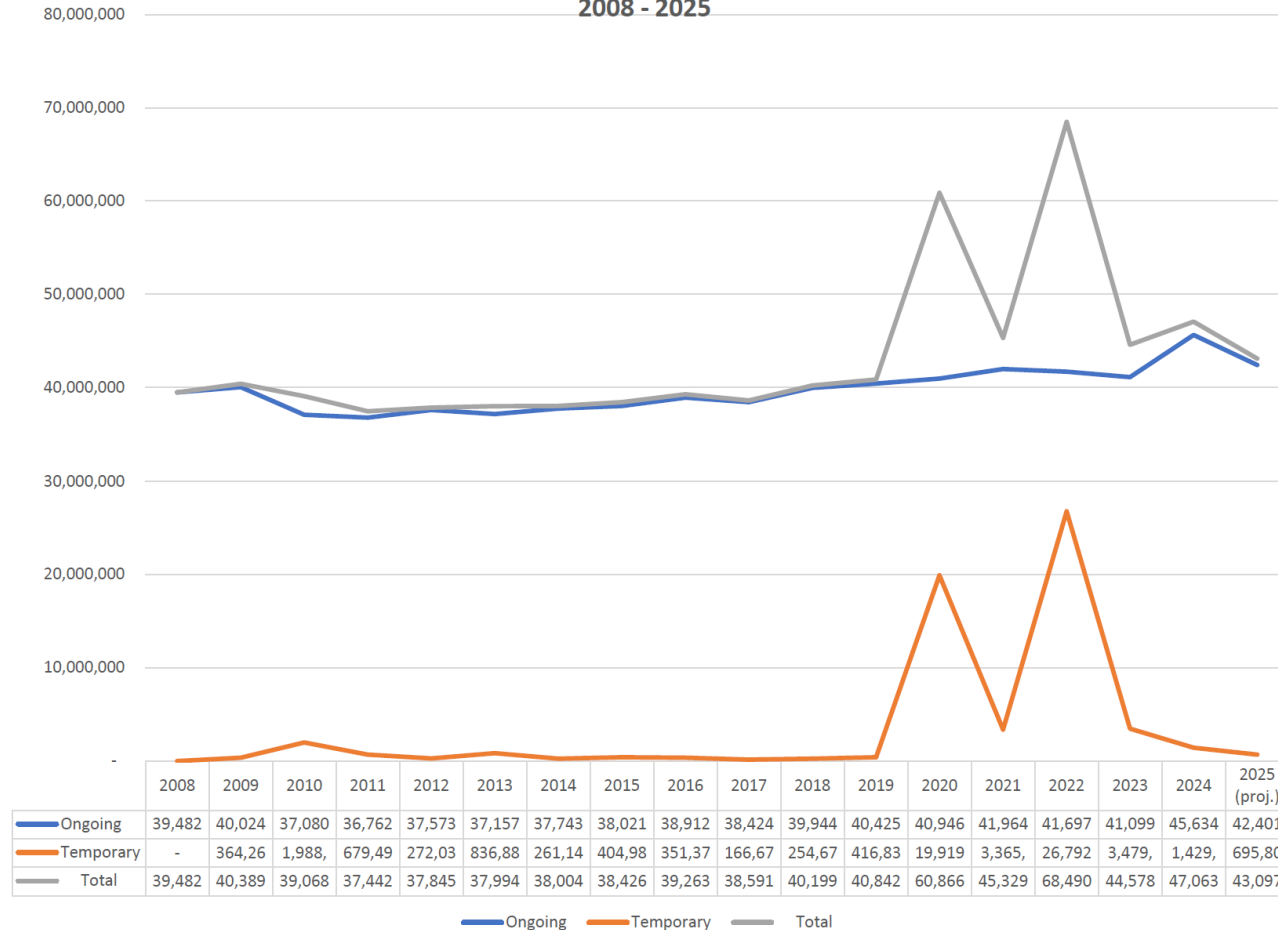
Units of Service



Funding and Inflation

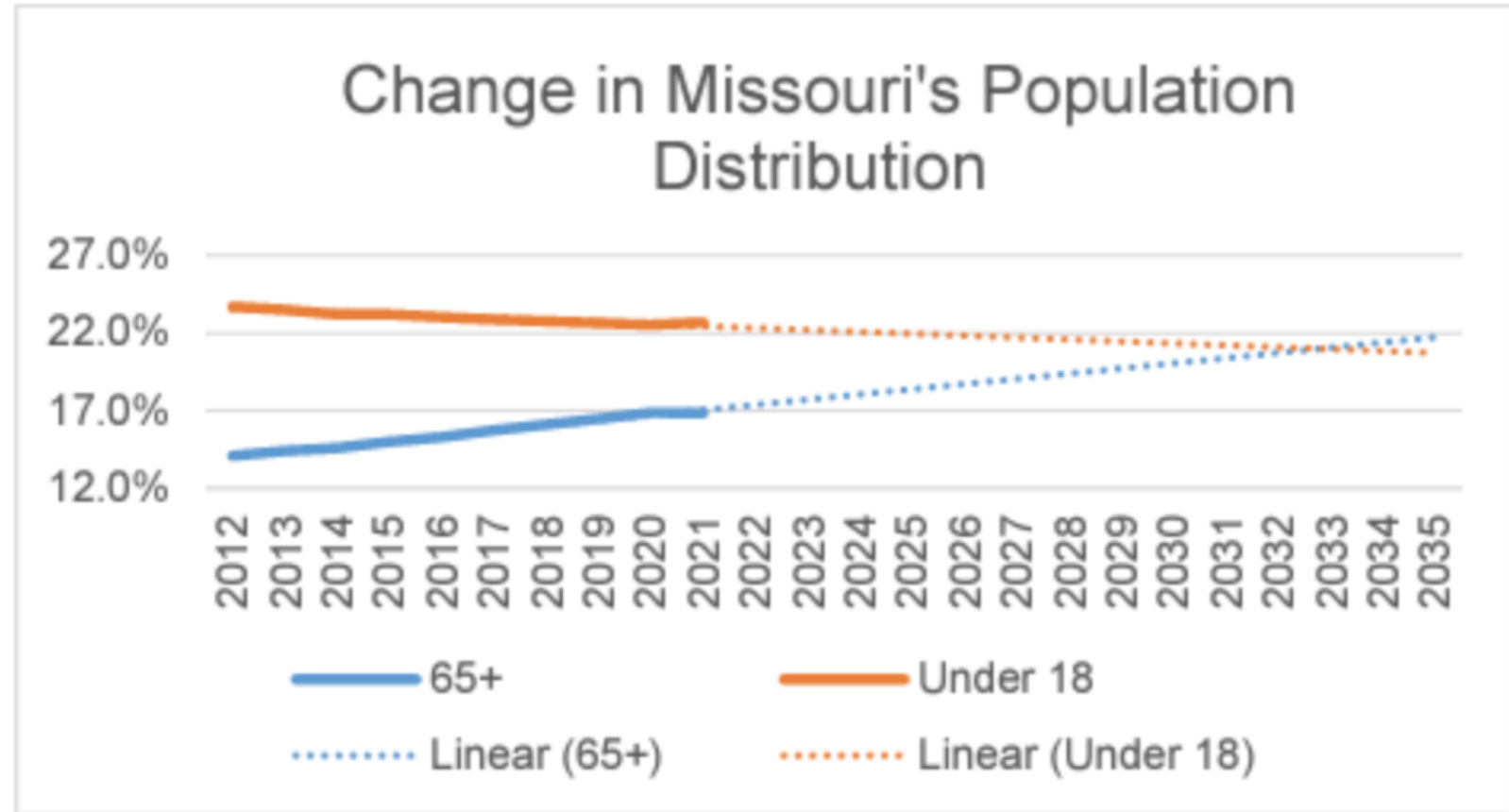

Funding Challenges



While the plan fosters strategic direction, new and expanded services are dependent on funding that is both stable and growing in correlation with the aging trend.

- Federal funding (Older Americans Act) is anticipated to remain level, despite inflation and growing demand.
- Missouri Senior Services Growth and Development funding and general revenue are essential for Area Agencies on Aging.
- Local support and county senior levies help tremendously.
