**VOTE: MAY 19, 2026 MEETING SUMMARY**

**1) Welcome/Introductions**

Kansas Co-Chair Mayor Eric Mikkelson confirmed a quorum and called the meeting to order. Online guests were asked to introduce themselves in the chat, and self-introductions for in-person attendees followed. Attendance of this meeting is included at the end of this summary.

**2) Action items**

**a. Vote: April 21, 2025 Meeting Summary**

No changes were suggested for the meeting summary.

**b. Vote: Missouri Unfunded Needs**

Transportation Planning Director Martin Rivarola reviewed the Missouri Unfunded Needs list, detailing changes that had been approved and recommended by the Missouri Programming Committee (MPC) and Technical Advisory Committee (TAC).

**c. Vote: ConnectedKC 2050 MTP Amendment - Central Avenue Bridge**

Martin Rivarola shared details of the Central Avenue Bridge project, which received federal funding and therefore needs to be included in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), which identifies projects that will be implemented in the Kansas City region. The committee expressed concern that the project does not include bike facilities, which would be in violation of the Major River Crossing Policy (MRCP). The committee questioned the details of the project to clarify if bike facilities were present, and requested they be included if not. After the committee took action on releasing the amendment for public review and comment as required by MARC's public participation plan, attendees confirmed that the project does include multi-use paths.

**Committee action:**

**Jack Messer moved to release the ConnectedKC 2050 MTP Amendment - Central Avenue Bridge for public review and comment, with request to report back to TTPC on the bike facilities across the bridge. Commissioner Janeé Hanzlick seconded the motion, and Josh Boehm abstained from the vote. The motion passed.**

**d. Vote: Greater Kansas City Regional Bikeway Plan Update**

Transportation Planner Patrick Trouba shared responses to the Regional Bikeway Plan Update, which was presented at the previous TTPC meeting and released for public review. Committee members clarified how alignment with the plan can improve scoring for suballocated transportation funding applications. The regional trails and bikeway map was recently updated and printed as well, and requests for copies can be directed to Patrick Trouba.

**e. Vote: 2026 Unified Planning Work Program - Amendment #2**

Transportation Programs Manager Marc Hansen briefly reviewed the second amendment to the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), which had been released for public review and comment. No comments were received.

**f. Vote: 2026 Special amendment #1 to the 2026-2030 Transportation Improvement Program**

The first special amendment on the 2026-2030 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) was released after last month's meeting for public review and comment. Three comments were received, including one request for mapping projects to be included in the amendment listing. MARC staff are actively working on implementing additional visualization techniques to address these concerns.

**g. Vote: 2026 Special amendment #2 to the 2026-2030 Transportation Improvement Program**

Marc Hansen reported on the second amendment to the 2026-2030 TIP, which involves adding two new projects (including the Central Avenue bridge project mentioned in item 2c) and modifying three existing projects with revenue-neutral changes to project funding.

**Committee action:**

Jack Messer moved to approve agenda items 2a through 2c and 2e through 2g as presented. Commissioner Janeé Hanzlick seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

**3) Reports**

**a. Report: Bistate Sustainable Reinvestment Corridor Planning**

MARC Director of Transportation & Environment Ron Achelpohl shared highlights of the project as well as anticipated outcomes. The project includes planning for transportation improvements, economic development on the corridor, and a focus on transit elements. Mr. Achelpohl shared details on design, anticipated costs and eligibility for federal funding, potential adjustments to account for the downtown baseball stadium, and next steps.

**b. Report: Planning Sustainable Places 2027 Call For Projects**

Planning Sustainable Places (PSP) Program Manager Beth Dawson announced the recently opened call for projects, which has \$1.3 million of funding available to award to projects in Missouri (\$500,000) and Kansas (\$800,000). Ms. Dawson reviewed the requirements and categories for applications and shared that a pre-application workshop will be hosted by MARC on Wednesday, May 20. Funding recommendations will be made by the Sustainable Places Policy Committee (SPPC), and be submitted to TTPC for review and approval at the September meeting.

**c. Report: Critical Urban Freight Corridors**

Transportation Planner Cy Splichal reviewed Critical Urban Freight Corridors (CUFC), which are in the process of being updated and reviewed by the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC). An interactive map of existing freight corridors is available on the [MARC website](#).

**d. Report: Safe Streets For All (SS4A) Application**

Transportation Planner and liaison to the Destination Safe Coalition Alicia Hunter reviewed MARC's upcoming application for SS4A funding. Ms. Hunter shared the details of the application and how interested jurisdictions can partner with MARC. The link

included in the original meeting packet for the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP) was incorrect; the CSAP can be found [here](#).

- e. **Report: US Department of State - Young leaders of the Americas visiting fellow**  
Martin Rivarola introduced Daniel Vasquez, one of seven selected individuals from over 1,000 applicants to participate in the U.S. Department of State's flagship Young Leaders of the Americas Initiative (YLA) fellowship program. Mr. Vasquez spoke of the fragmented transportation system in the Dominican Republic, and how his company Easy Rental helps provide sustainable mobility for tourists and commuters. Fellows of the YLA program will end the program with a forum in Washington, D.C.

**4) Other Business**

The committee congratulated the Kansas City Streetcar Authority on their opening of the Riverfront extension.

The House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee released their version of the transportation reauthorization bill, and MARC staff are reviewing the bill to evaluate any changes to federal funding/criteria. Committee members were encouraged to visit the National Association of Counties (NACo) website for a quick review of the provisions of the bill.

The next TTPC meeting will be virtual only as MARC prepares to move offices to 801 Pennsylvania.

**5) Adjournment**

Co-Chair Mikkelson adjourned the meeting.

### VOTE: 2026 SUBALLOCATED CALL FOR PROJECTS - PROJECT ALIGNMENT STATUS

#### BACKGROUND

One of MARC's fundamental roles as Metropolitan Planning Organization is to facilitate processes for cooperative decision-making about the use of federal transportation dollars for projects and programs in the Kansas City area. A call for projects for the Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) program, Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) and Surface Transportation Block Grant Program - Set Aside Program (TAP) programs [was conducted](#) and closed in March of 2026.

MARC conducts the 2026 call for projects in two phases. The first phase (ongoing) assesses project applications for consistency with regional plans and policies. The second phase will evaluate project applications using the scoring methodologies established by the various programming committees as in previous funding rounds.

MARC staff conducted an evaluation/assessment of all projects submitted in response to this call for projects. This evaluation/assessment was then released to members of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) for review, concurrence and additional feedback. Concurrence with staff evaluation and feedback was collected from members of the TAC. In its meeting of June 3, 2026, the committee reviewed staff assessments, committee responses, and forwarded a recommendation to the TTPC for completed Phase 1 project assessments.

The project categorizations as a result of Phase 1 is advisory in nature and will be taken into account in committee considerations post the Phase 2 call for projects. Project sponsors will be provided feedback out of Phase 1 and can modify/adjust scope of projects and application narratives in order to address staff/committee comments. Recategorization of projects during Phase 2 will then be considered as needed and on a case by case basis.

During the upcoming TTPC meeting, staff will provide a summary of TAC submitted recommendations. **A summary report is included following this staff report.**

#### POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

It is the policy of the Mid-America Regional Council to award suballocated federal transportation funding to eligible projects that advance regional goals, objectives, strategies and actions as articulated in [Connected KC 2050](#), the metropolitan transportation plan for the Kansas City region.

## BUDGET CONSIDERATIONS

Preliminary funding amounts for the two-year period of FFY 2029-2030 are noted in the following table. These amounts remain subject to change during the call for projects timeframe.

**VOTE: CONNECTEDKC 2050 MTP AMENDMENT #2 - CENTRAL AVENUE BRIDGE**

**BACKGROUND**

The Central Avenue River bridge was closed to traffic in 2021 because of safety and structural conditions. The closure of this bridge imposed significant impacts on travelers, freight movement, surrounding industry and local businesses, emergency services, and residents in the region. The Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) and the Unified Government/Kansas City, Kansas (UG/KCK) partnered to study and evaluate bridge replacement alternatives and determined a preferred alternative. Following a river crossing study initiated by the UG/KCK, KDOT determined that an on-alignment alternative for the Central Avenue bridge over I-70 and the UPRR is not only viable, but preferable.

On January 22, 2026, Governor Kelly announced a \$135 million federal award to aid in the replacement of the Central Ave. bridge and other bridges in adjoining interchanges. The project spans approximately 3,900 feet between 6th and James streets and includes full reconstruction of the bridge complex. The project will include replacement of the interchange and bridge over I-70, a new bridge crossing over Union Pacific Railyard, improvements to the I-670 WB exit ramp and I-670 EB entry ramp. Replacement of the steel truss bridge over the Kansas River on existing alignment, added benefit of allowing for a bicycle/pedestrian facility along Central Ave where none exists.

It is the project sponsors' intent to construct these facilities as part of this bridge replacement project. The funding package for completion of these improvements is not yet complete, but active work continues to secure needed funds via discretionary grant funding opportunities.

**POLICY CONSIDERATIONS**

*Major River Crossings Policy:* This project, as proposed, conforms with this policy by providing bicycle /pedestrian accommodations.

*Financial Constraint:* There is financial capacity in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan for this project's budget, as stated.

*CKC2050 System Preservation and System Efficiency Goals:* This project conforms with the System Preservation goal in CKC2050 to replace a key is a transportation connection.

*Regional Bikeways and Trails:* The scope of this project does not allow for direct connection to existing or planned regional bikeways or trails. However, the provision of pedestrian and bike accommodations across the bridge creates an opportunity for future connections.

**COMMITTEE ACTION**

TAC reviewed this MTP Amendment Request on May 6, 2026 and forwards a recommendation of approval to the TTPC. TTPC released the project for review and comments. Received comments and proposed responses are included following this staff report.

Of them, ONE, Hwy 9 at North Kansas City is fully safe and suitable for pedestrian and bicycle traffic. The Missouri 92 bridge is but two narrower lanes, it is in planning for rebuild, but have KDOT and MODOT considered it for cycling.

An additional issue is the day/evening population of downtown KCMO. It appears to be going to gain a stadium of 30-40,000 seats, which at capacity will pump 10-20,000 automobiles into downtown. KCMO, MARC, MODOT and KDOT appear not to have considered the surge in demand for parking. From my experience, bicycles and parallel parked cars on streets are serious injury to lethal accidents waiting to happen.

Your policy will need to fit the urban sprawl of the Metro, on both sides of the River/State Line Blvd.

## VOTE: CRITICAL URBAN FREIGHT CORRIDORS

### BACKGROUND

Critical Urban Freight Corridors (CUFCs) are important freight corridors that provide critical connectivity to the Nation Highway Freight Network (NHFN). By designating these important corridors, States and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) can strategically direct resources towards improved performance and efficiency of goods movement.

By securing this status, local and state authorities can access federal funding for these corridors through the National Highway Freight Program. Additionally, these designations help prioritize infrastructure repairs, increase coordination between local, state, and federal transportation planning, and improve the overall efficiency of regional supply chains.

In urbanized areas with a population of 500,000 or more individuals, the MPO may designate CUFCs in consultation with the State. MARC designates the CUFCs in the Kansas City urbanized area in coordination with the Kansas and Missouri Departments of Transportation. A public road designated as a CUFC must meet one or more of the following elements:

- a) connects an intermodal facility to:
  - a. the PHFS;
  - b. the Interstate System; or
  - c. an intermodal freight facility;
- b) is located within a corridor of a route on the PHFS and provides an alternative highway option important to goods movement;
- c) serves a major freight generator, logistic center, or manufacturing and warehouse industrial land; or
- d) is important to the movement of freight within the region, as determined by the MPO or the State.

Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) has asked MARC to review the CUFCs in the Kansas City urban area to incorporate into an update of the Kansas State Freight and Rail Plan. Staff presented an overview of this information in May.

MARC staff developed a list of prioritized corridors based on projects identified in existing plans and programs, including MARC's long-range transportation plan Connected KC 2050, suballocated call for projects for Surface Transportation Block Grants (STBG), and MARC's regional freight plan Connected Freight KC 2050.

This list was reviewed by city staff from identified jurisdictions and prioritized into three tiers based on scoring and alignment with MTP and local priorities. MARC's Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) voted to recommend approval of the following list of CUFCs in the Kansas counties of the Kansas City urbanized area:

**VOTE: REGIONAL PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AGENCY SAFETY PLAN PERFORMANCE MEASURE TARGET (PTASP)**

**BACKGROUND**

The Federal Transit Administration requires Metropolitan Planning Organizations to adopt regional targets for the performance measures included in Public Transportation Agency Safety Plans (PTASP). These measures cover a wide range of safety-related metrics. The “rates” noted are calculated per 100,000 Vehicle Revenue Mile (VRM):

- Collision Rate
- Pedestrian Collision Rate
- Vehicular Collision Rate
- Fatalities
- Fatality Rate
- Transit Worker Fatality Rate
- Injuries
- Injury Rate
- Transit Worker Injury Rate
- Assaults on Transit Workers
- Rate of Assaults on Transit Workers
- System Reliability

These measures apply separately to each mode. The modes in the MARC region include Fixed Route Bus, MicroTransit, and Streetcar.

MARC staff consulted KCATA, Johnson County Transit, KC Streetcar, and Unified Government of Wyandotte County/Kansas City, Kansas PTASP reports to develop these targets. For modes where only one transit agency operates in the region (e.g. streetcar) staff recommend adopting the agency’s targets. For modes where more than one transit agency operates in the region, staff have developed regional targets that accommodate all agencies’ targets.
