Exemplary Core Capacities

REPORT: Update on MARC's Community Engagement protocol developed through a Health Forward Foundation capacity building grant.

BACKGROUND

The Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) received three rounds of funding for a capacity building grant from Health Forward Foundation (HFF) in 2024 through 2026. The purpose of the funding was to enable MARC staff to examine existing community engagement efforts and develop an organization-wide approach for how we engage with external stakeholders.

Funding was used to hire a consultant to support an existing staff work group, provide training for staff, and support internal capacity and staff time. Project accomplishments include:

- Conducting staff focus groups on community engagement
- Providing staff training from KU
- Facilitating multiple workshops with staff on identifying what is foundational to community engagement at MARC
- Launching a community of practice for MARC staff
- Launching an online toolkit of resources, training and best practices for staff
- Developing a community engagement protocol and checklist for MARC staff

MARC has received notification that funding from HFF will not continue into 2027. MARC staff will report on the final deliverables and continued practices that have evolved from this work. Staff are currently assessing how to support and sustain these activities moving forward to continue improving MARC's community engagement efforts.

This work supports MARC's regional vision, specifically around "Engaged People", an area of the regional vision that focuses on the benefit of strong social networks, civic engagement, and empowered communities.

REPORT: Engagement opportunity with the regional transportation Public Participation Plan

BACKGROUND

The regional transportation Public Participation Plan (PPP) guides the public engagement processes and activities of the Mid-America Regional Council's (MARC) Transportation and Environment Department. The PPP provides a framework that guides public involvement in transportation planning projects; and specifies goals, strategies, and techniques that encourage successful public participation.

MARC staff have been developing an update of the plan over the course of 2026. This update process included internal workshopping and engagement, external engagement, and a peer review of participation methods utilized by other metropolitan planning organizations.

This process also overlapped with an internal effort to improve community engagement practices, funded by a grant through the Health Forward Foundation. This process focused on capacity building for MARC staff to identify best practices, goals, and strategies to improve community engagement across the agency. Outcomes and deliverables from that effort will be integrated into the updated plan.

Key updates included in this iteration of the PPP include updated guidance on:

- Using social media for engagement
- Engaging committees
- Utilizing consulting firms for engagement
- Coordinating annual engagement workplans

MARC staff will present on the plan update and share feedback from engagement activities. The PPP is due for approval by MARC's Board of Directors by December 2026. The Technical Advisory Committee will review a draft version of the plan at their October meeting. The TTPC will then review the plan and vote to release it for a 45-day public comment period at their October meeting.

In accordance with 23 CFR 450.316, MPOs must create a Public Participation Plan that establishes requirements for engagement around core MPO products. Under this requirement, MPOs must allow for:

- adequate public notice of public participation activities;
- review and comment at key decision points in the development of the MTP and TIP;
- and multiple, accessible participation formats, including electronic and in-person.

BACKGROUND

The Kansas City region's vibrant, green and connected centers and corridors are central to the Creating Sustainable Places initiative, and the region's long-range transportation plan, Connected KC 2050. In 2012, the Mid-America Regional Council's (MARC) Total Transportation Policy Committee (TTPC) and the Creating Sustainable Places (CSP) Coordinating Committee launched Planning Sustainable Places (PSP), a combined initiative to provide communities with planning resources to advance sustainable projects in their corridors and centers.

MARC issued the eighth PSP call for projects on May 4, 2026, and it closed on June 22, 2026. MARC staff conducted an initial review and scoring of the 28 applications and worked with the Sustainable Places Policy Committee (SPPC) to develop a recommended funding list. The recommended list can be found as an attachment to this agenda report.

Additionally, the PSP program was awarded an additional \$80,000 through the 2026 Amendment #1 to the 2026-2030 Transportation Improvement Program that the MARC Board approved on May 26, 2026.

REPORT: Update on Missouri Solid Waste Management District Program Changes.

BACKGROUND

For 30 years, Missouri's solid waste management districts have helped communities reduce waste going to landfills. Through the Mid-America Regional Council's (MARC) role in operating our region's district, we support effective and innovative local reuse and recycling programs; glass, mattress, and construction-debris recycling; household hazardous materials collection; and timely management and distribution of grant funds to the local organizations providing these services.

The Missouri Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) recently announced changes that will negatively affect how Missouri's Solid Waste Management District grants are funded and managed. The department is currently holding back grant funds and moving operating payments from the start of the fiscal year to quarterly payments, which will create cash-flow problems for districts. MDNR also plans to impact local grantmaking by mandating a new statewide application form and scoring rubric and by assuming direct management of grant reimbursements and reporting.

We believe these changes are inconsistent with state law. A legal assessment from MARC's legal advisors, Stinson LLC, found that they conflict with statutory requirements and court precedent.

MARC has shared this assessment with MDNR and Governor Mike Kehoe. We have urged MDNR to stop the new grant management system, release funds as required by law, and work with solid waste districts on practical, lawful ways to improve the system. Because local governments rely on these funds to provide solid waste services, staff have also shared this information with local officials and encouraged them to share these concerns with MDNR Director Jake Buxton, Governor Kehoe, and state legislators. Director Buxton has offered to meet to discuss our concerns, and we are working to schedule this meeting.

On a related topic, the Missouri Senate Select Committee on Abandoned Landfill Remediation held a hearing on September 15, 2026. This committee was established in the aftermath of proposed legislation in 2026 that would have diverted funding from solid waste districts to other purposes. Staff attended the hearing and offered perspectives on how solid waste districts could support strategies to manage abandoned landfills.

Staff will provide an update on both issues at the meeting.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

MDNR's proposed changes will reduce local control of waste reduction programs in Missouri.

BUDGET CONSIDERATIONS

MDNR's proposed changes will negatively impact district cash flows and may also impact timely reimbursements to district grant recipients.

REPORT: Presentation on FEMA regional flood hazard maps

BACKGROUND

September 2026 is National Preparedness Month. This year's theme—Americans Stand Ready—empowers individuals to take charge of their own readiness. Observed since 2004, National Preparedness Month encourages Americans to prepare for emergencies. The month is a great time to take small steps to make a big difference in being prepared - and to promote preparedness in your communities.

As part of our region's preparedness, it is important to understand the existing and potential hazards within our communities. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is the official public source for flood hazard information produced in support of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Flood hazards are dynamic and can change frequently because of a variety of factors, including weather patterns, erosion, and new development. The official flood map shows a community's different flood hazard areas. These may include high-hazard (Special Flood Hazard Areas), moderate- to low-hazard, and undetermined areas. Different flood insurance and building requirements apply to these flood hazard areas. FEMA works with communities to collect new or updated flood hazard data and periodically updates flood maps to reflect these changes.

The Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) is aware of proposed changes to flood plain maps across our nine-county region. Revisions to the 100-year and 500-year flood plains can significantly impact existing community businesses and residences. With each map update, there is an open public review and appeal process. It is important for community leaders to be aware of these changes, bring forward public comments to FEMA, and prepare for the potential impact as these changes can impact insurability and point to new risks. MARC has been working to integrate these new mapping layers into our data hub.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

When a new map is issued or an effective map is revised, the jurisdictional mapped flood hazard, as well as building or insurance requirements, may change. An effective map is one that has been through the public review and appeal process and has been adopted as a regulatory Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). It is important for local communities to be aware of these potential changes. **FEMA holds local jurisdictions responsible for notifying their residents and commercial property owners.**

Notable Recent Grants:

- **Health Forward Foundation.** A grant was awarded to the MARC CSC to continue support for training and to strengthen the Community Health Worker (CHW) workforce, while aligning with community paramedic programs and the Community Support Network (CSN) advanced community care hub at MARC.
- **Kansas Health Foundation.** A grant has been awarded to the MARC CSC focused on Empowering Upward Mobility Beyond the Walls: CHW Career Pathways. The approach will build on the successful KDHE pilot program that trained correction facility residents with nationally recognized CHWs core competencies & skills.

Item 1 Introductions and board sharing time

Mayor Beto Lopez called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m. and welcomed attendees. Due to the meeting being held remotely and in-person, Mayor Lopez provided instructions for participation. He reported that staff would present on all the agenda items, provide an opportunity for comments and questions after each item, and ask for approval of all agenda items and the consent agenda at the end of the meeting. Members will have an opportunity to abstain or object to any items necessary during the vote.

Item 2a REPORT: HUD PRO Housing funding opportunity to promote development of affordable housing across the Kansas City region.

Hannah Mitchell, Regional Housing Program Manager, explained to the board that MARC submitted a \$9.71 million application on August 3, 2026 to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's FY 2026 PRO Housing program to expand attainable homeownership and address housing barriers across the Kansas City region. The proposal includes more than 110 new homeownership units through four construction-ready projects in Kansas City,

Kansas; Excelsior Springs, Independence and Kansas City, Missouri. Projects were selected based on factors including proximity to Opportunity Zones, demonstrated policy or regulatory progress, site control, construction readiness and capacity to complete grant activities.

If awarded, \$8.7 million would be distributed to subrecipients for construction and infrastructure, while the remaining funds would support MARC's regional policy coordination, technical assistance and grant administration. MARC would work with local governments, developers, employers and community partners to reduce regulatory, policy and procedural barriers to housing and establish a durable regional framework for continued collaboration. This grant application would benefit the entire nine-county region through shared resources, tools and technical assistance.

Ms. Mitchell also mentioned that this item was included in the July 2026 Administrative Action packet that will be voted on with the consent agenda. Due to the tight turnaround for an application, staff submitted before the August Board meeting with executive director approval.

Commissioner Stieben asked if this grant (or the 21st Century Road to Housing grant) covers rural, suburban, and ex-urban needs instead of just the urban core? Ms. Mitchell said that the HUD PRO Housing grant had requirements to be focused on Opportunity Zones which tend to be more urban.

Commissioner Brewer asked if there was a residency requirement for those that benefit from the projects that are funded through this program? Ms. Mitchell said yes that HUD has very strict reporting guidelines on who receives funding and who is the ultimate beneficiary of the funds.

Mr. Hurlbert asked if the funded units were divided equally among the jurisdictions. Ms. Mitchell answered that the number of unit may differ between the jurisdictions but that the amount of funding is dispersed comparably between the jurisdictions.

Councilmember Bunch asked how many units would be funded through this grant for KCMO. Ms. Mitchell said that 30 units were identified for the Housing Accelerator Program in KCMO but that there will also be infrastructure funded that will allow for many more units in the future.

Item 3a REPORT: Presentation on the Phase 1 win of the Administration for Community Living Health At Home Challenge.

Kristi Bohling-DaMetz, Director of Aging and Adult Services, presented to the board that MARC was selected as one of 10 Phase 1 winners in the Administration for Community Living's Health at Home Challenge, which recognizes advanced community care networks serving Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries with complex health and functional needs. As the lead entity for a statewide Missouri collaborative, the Mid-America Community Support Network with ma4 and the Saint Louis Integrated Health Network will work to strengthen connections between health care providers and community-based organizations that deliver essential in-home services and support key functions such as contracting, billing, referrals, technology, data, compliance and reporting.

The initiative is drawing national press as "the most audacious Medicare experiment of 2026," and MARC has been named one of seven ACL 2026 Chronic Disease Self-Management Education grant recipients — a three-year, \$1.2M Missouri statewide award that serves as a first step toward Phase 2. Planning is now underway to extend the model into Kansas.

The challenge includes three competitive phases, with teams required to win each phase to advance and up to \$2 million available in each phase. MARC received a \$200,000 Phase 1 award and may compete for Phase 2, which will select up to five teams, followed by Phase 3 with no more than three winners. The initiative seeks to improve community-clinical integration for up to one million dually eligible and near-dually eligible individuals nationwide who have multiple chronic conditions and at least one functional limitation; this statewide Missouri item is presented for information only.

Item 4a REPORT: Updates regarding local planning for sustained public investment in early childhood through Connecting the P.I.E.C.E.S.

Dr. Toni Sturdivant, Director of Early Learning, presented a Civic Implementation Plan for sustained public investment in Kansas City's early childhood system. Several foundational steps have already been taken through: ECEinKC.org, a regional repository of high-quality learning experiences; Seeds of Change, a workforce initiative running recruitment fairs and credentialing new educators; and MO Child Care Works, a mechanism letting multiple funding sources split child care tuition, with a Kansas version launching soon. The plan itself is organized around three pillars – local sustainable funding (identifying viable revenue sources and the right investment mix), governance (oversight structures ensuring new revenue is used effectively and equitably), and public will (stakeholder alignment and information infrastructure).

Execution of the plan runs across three phases over eight months, from vision alignment and peer-locality research, through direction and strategy including a fall summit for civic and business leaders, to plan finalization and publication by February. Research in other peer regions suggest various options for generating revenue: Cincinnati raises roughly \$15M from 30% of a CPS property tax levy, Denver about \$20M from a .15% sales tax, San Antonio about \$51M from a 1/8-cent sales tax, and New Orleans \$20M+ via a local millage with a limited-time 1:1 state match.

The board was asked to weigh in on five design tradeoffs that will shape the plan: breadth versus depth; structure versus services; age range; eligibility; and delivery model. The board engaged in varied discussions around the tradeoffs and due to the lack of time, were encouraged to reach out to Dr. Sturdivant to further their input. Beyond this feedback, three concrete engagement opportunities are open to board members: joining the Implementation Team, participating in the Fall Summit, and serving as an Information Champion.

Item 5 Executive Director's Report

Executive Director Warm provided updates on several matters requiring board awareness, including pending Missouri Department of Natural Resources regulations that could significantly affect Solid Waste Management District grant funding and administration, proposed federal Head Start regulations with potential implications for program quality and operations, and the status of MARC's office relocation to 801 Penn. He also reported recent grants MARC has applied for or received including a regional health data platform for wastewater disease tracking, improvements to the I-29/I-35 freeway intersection through a USDOT BUILD grant, and training and resources for stream and wetland conservation through an EPA riparian grant.

BACKGROUND

The administration for Children and Families (ACF), Office of Head Start (OHS) awarded \$32,918,852 to the Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) Head Start program for the 2024-2025 grant year. \$1,034,132 went unspent as the result of the YMCA closure and several projects were not completed by the end of the grant year, October 31, 2025.

In March of 2026, the MARC board approved the MARC Head Start program to submit a request to ACF's OHS to carry over \$253,553 of the unspent funds into the 2025-2026 grant year for playground repairs and upgrades.

In response to the submission, the OHS requested that MARC Head Start, first, submit a budget modification to move funds from the contractual services line to the equipment line to support the playground work described in the carry-over request. A budget revision is required when re-budgeting across cost categories exceeds 10 percent in any single direct-cost category. The budget modification must be approved before the OHS can decide on the previous board-approved carry-over request.

BACKGROUND

The Administration of Child and Families (ACF) funds 80 percent of the total operating costs of Head Start Preschool and Early Head Start grants. The remaining 20 percent must come from in-kind donations or funds from the community. These contributions must come from non-federal sources and must support necessary, reasonable and allowable costs for operating the program to be counted toward the 20 percent match. Head Start non-federal share contributions generally come in the form of volunteer services, donated or loaned equipment or space, donated supplies, land, or buildings.

The required federal match for the Head Start grant ending October 31, 2026, is \$8,281,348. MARC has identified contributions totaling \$4,901,948 leaving a balance due of \$3,327,764. MARC Head Start therefore is seeking a waiver from ACF not to exceed the remaining balance of \$3,327,764. Staff are confident that additional in-kind funds will be identified but want to obtain Board approval for the full amount because it is difficult to project how much will be identified. The waiver will only be submitted in the event that we do not identify the remaining balance before the end of the grant period.

VOTE: Authorization to submit a Federal Highway Administration PROTECT grant application to improve regional transportation infrastructure.

BACKGROUND

The Federal Highway Administration (FWA) has issued a Notice of Funding Opportunity for the Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient and Cost-Saving Transportation (PROTECT) Discretionary Grant Program. The program supports efforts to improve the resilience of transportation infrastructure and strengthen the ability of communities to anticipate, prepare for and adapt to natural hazards and changing conditions. The Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) intends to submit a planning grant application by the October 9, 2026, deadline to continue advancing the [Transportation Resiliency KC](#) initiative.

The proposed application would build on two earlier phases of regional resilience planning. Phase 1 established a foundational framework through stakeholder engagement, initial risk concepts and a preliminary approach for screening and prioritizing transportation vulnerabilities. Phase 2 is advancing a detailed, data-driven assessment of the region's multimodal transportation system and development of a regional Transportation Resilience Improvement Plan. This work includes assessing risks under current and future extreme weather conditions, identifying at-risk transportation assets, evaluating the consequences of transportation disruptions and developing analytical and decision-support resources to help guide regional investment priorities.

The next phase is expected to focus on planning and technical capacity building that will help MARC and its regional partners move from regional risk assessment and prioritization toward implementation. Potential planning activities would build on the findings, tools and priority needs identified through Phases 1 and 2 and further integrate resilience considerations into regional and local transportation planning and investment decisions. Technical capacity-building activities would help local governments, transportation agencies and other partners strengthen their ability to understand resilience risks, use available planning resources, coordinate across jurisdictions and agencies and advance resilient transportation projects. The application is still under development. Definition of the final scope of work and funding request is underway. MARC anticipates requesting no more than \$2 million in federal funding. Planning grants awarded through the PROTECT program do not require a local match.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

This effort advances Connected KC and the Kansas City Regional Climate Action Plan by integrating extreme weather impacts into transportation planning and supporting the technical capacity of local governments and other partners to make informed planning and funding decisions as they address flooding, heat and other extreme weather impacts on the regional transportation system.

VOTE: Accept funding for the Senior Growth and Development Program SFY 2027 contract with the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services for older adult programming

BACKGROUND

The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services established the Senior Services Growth and Development Program (SSGDP) to provide additional funding for older adult programming through MO Area Agencies on Aging (AAA). SSGDP was created in 2019 to provide funding to enhance services for the development and expansion of senior center programs, facilities, and services. In addition, it is intended to be utilized for any activities related to services for older adults in the Mid-America Regional Council's (MARC) planning and service area (PSA). However, no funds were appropriated to the project until the 102nd General Assembly.

With revenue shortfalls at the state, SSGDP funding was cut across AAAs by 20% for SFY 2026. MARC's initial contract is in the amount of \$1,112,796. Fifty percent of these funds are designated for the development and expansion of the senior center programs, facilities, and services. The other fifty percent shall be used for any activities and programs that enhance services for older adults in MARC's planning and service area (PSA), Jackson, Clay, Cass, Platte, and Ray counties in Missouri.

VOTE: Authorize an agreement with the City of Olathe for Fire Analyst staffing at the Kansas City Regional Fusion Center.

BACKGROUND

The Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) has been awarded Kansas State Homeland Security Grant Program funding to support regional security projects and is proposing a contract with the City of Olathe to support the Kansas City Regional Fusion Center. The Olathe Fire Department will provide up to \$60,000 to support one part-time Fire Analyst assigned to the Kansas City Regional Fusion Center from July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2027. The position will support regional information sharing, analysis and coordination among fire services, emergency medical services, emergency management, healthcare, private-sector partners and other public safety disciplines.

BUDGET CONSIDERATIONS

The agreement is funded with Kansas State Homeland Security Grant Program funds and will operate on a reimbursement basis. The Olathe Fire Department will pay eligible salary costs and submit monthly invoices with payroll documentation, signed timesheets and proof of payment. MARC will reimburse actual eligible costs, not to exceed \$60,000.

RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the executive director to enter into a professional services agreement with the City of Olathe, by and through the Olathe Fire Department, in an amount not to exceed \$60,000 for Fire Analyst staffing at the Kansas City Regional Fusion Center for the period July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2027.

VOTE: Authorize a subrecipient agreement with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment for the Hospital Preparedness Program.

BACKGROUND

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) has offered the Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) a subrecipient agreement to serve as fiscal agent for a regional health care coalition under the federal Hospital Preparedness Program. The program is intended to strengthen health care coalition readiness, collaboration and recovery capabilities for disasters and emergencies that exceed the day-to-day capacity of individual health care and emergency response systems. The MARC emergency services department is already leading this work on the Missouri-side of the state line with the Administration for Strategic Preparedness and Response (ASPR).

The Kansas agreement identifies \$155,000 in federal funds and a term beginning September 21, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027. MARC would be responsible for fiscal administration and for ensuring completion of the coalition work plan and required Readiness and Response Coordinator functions.

BUDGET CONSIDERATIONS

The agreement identifies \$155,000 in federal Hospital Preparedness Program funds. Payments are tied to financial status reports, supporting invoices, progress reports and completion of program requirements.

COMMITTEE ACTION

The Bi-state Health Care Coalition supports this action. The KS-side Healthcare Coalition met on September 11, 2026, and voted to support MARC in this role.

RELATED JURISDICTIONS

The agreement is intended to support the health care coalition and participating health care and emergency response organizations in the applicable Kansas region (Wyandotte, Johnson, and Leavenworth counties).

RECOMMENDATION

Authorize entering into a subrecipient agreement with KDHE for the Hospital Preparedness Program in an amount not to exceed \$155,000 for the period September 21, 2026, through June 30, 2027.
